Morse Code Saves the Day

I've a short story to tell about how Morse Code saved the day while serving in the Navy ... Having spent 2 years on active-duty '67-'68 aboard the USS Hassayampa AO-145 (see pictures), one of three, giant fleet oilers, I decided to stay in the US Navy Reserves for a 2nd 6-year enlistment. The "Hass", as she was called, and her two sister ships, were capable of underway replenishment (UNREP) of ships at speeds that allowed aircraft carriers to launch aircraft while being refueled, thereby maintaining mission-status. Anyway, during the 2nd enlistment, I took the 5wpm Novice test and received my Novice ticket, all CW for the entire first year, of course. So, I got very proficient at it as I practiced for 12wpm and a General Class ticket.

During that period, Navy Reservists were required to take a 2-week refresher cruise every year, which was a nice break from my civilian job. Since my rate/rank was as a Radarman 3rd Class, I spent my time while aboard these cruises hanging out with the Signalmen or Radiomen, when not standing a watch in the Combat Information Center (CIC). Of course, the Signalmen all knew Morse Code, so we had something in common to talk about.

On one particular 2-week cruise to San Diego on a destroyer out of Treasure Island, we were moored at a dock with a good view of ships coming in/out of San Diego harbor. While most everyone was ashore on liberty, I caught a Quarterdeck watch guarding the gangway. I was basically in charge of the safety of the ship for 4 hours, answering the phone, regulating and logging who came aboard, or left, if not assigned to the crew. Well, during one watch, a

shipmate came up, all excited, saying there was US Navy destroyer in the middle of the harbor channel signaling with flashing light, about 200 yards from our position, so I went to investigate.



As it turned out, the ship was flashing Morse Code, and I began to copy without thinking too much about it, my mind making the translation from sight, to brain, to letters in Morse. Anyway, I quickly discovered they had lost power, and were now drifting with no steerage. Fortunately, it wasn't a windy day! I ran back to the Quarterdeck and called the Harbor Master who dispatched a tug to rescue the drifting ship ... and we watched the rescue drama take place.

Anyway, I logged the incident into the Quarterdeck log book and didn't think much about it. I did get a thank you call from the Harbor Master for my quick action. And, I impressed those who

witnessed the event and my decode of the flashing light. Everyone wondering why in the world a Radarman would know Morse Code. It was a fulfilling experience using a skill learned from Amateur Radio during a "rescue mission". Hi! I went on to practice sending with flashing light, and even learned how to use semaphore flags to send messages on subsequent cruises, ship-to-ship. And that's my "sea story" for this issue.
